## POLLINATOR-FRIENDLY PLANTS

If you're wanting to attract butterflies and

hummingbirds to your yard, there are many shrubs and flowers to choose from, regardless of your experience with gardening. Reds, blues, and yellows are common colors that these petite pollinators tend to love, and they should be thoughtfully incorporated into your landscape.

## **Plants that Attract Hummingbirds**

Of the 16 species of hummingbirds in the United States, only about 3 species are found in Florida, with the red-throated hummingbird probably being the most commonly spotted. Hummingbirds have a difficult time getting the amount of food they require from flowers alone, so including feeders in your design will both attract and keep them around for a while. However, flowers are what will initially draw them to your garden.
